## 63 BC/23/25 TO CONFIRM THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 24 OCTOBER 2023

#### 64 BC/23/26 ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM THE CHAIRMAN AND LEADER

- 64.1 The Chair referred Councillors to Paper BC/23/26 for noting.
- 64.2 The Chair invited the Acting Leader of the Council to make his announcements.
- 64.3 Councillor Ward made the following announcements:

"We were pleased to hear we have been awarded funding of £115,000 to help offset increased utility costs at Hadleigh Pool & Leisure. The successful bid came from the Sport England Phase 1 Swimming Pool Grants funding. Unfortunately, a first-round bid for funding to help the Kingfisher Leisure Centre in Sudbury was unsuccessful. As councillors will know, swimming pools are particularly dependent on energy use, so inflation and soaring energy bills have put leisure providers under increasing financial pressure. We obviously welcome this funding, and hope for further support in the second round for all our pools and leisure centres facing the same challenge.

It is a month since severe flooding hit a number of our communities, and for many of our residents the recovery continues. The Government has announced grants for homes and businesses that were impacted - £500 for homes, and £2,500 for businesses — to assist with initial recovery costs. Babergh District Council has been working with neighbouring districts and Suffolk County Council to get these grants to those eligible as quickly as we can. We will be able to start distributing funding before the end of this month. I would like to remind everyone that all reports of property flooding need to be submitted via the Suffolk County Council website.

You may have seen the announcement earlier today that we have launched a new 'Living Well in Winter' grant to help communities tackle issues like social isolation and the need for 'warm spaces' this winter. The funding means that the councils can help communities tackle social isolation and address the choice for some residents of whether to heat or eat this winter as the cost-of-living crisis continues to take its toll. Community groups can apply for a minimum of £500 and a maximum of £2,000. Applications are now open and can be submitted until Sunday, 17<sup>th</sup> December.

You will all probably be aware now that the Suffolk Borough and District Leaders wrote an open letter of support to the leader of South Cambridgeshire District Council, Councillor Bridget Smith, regarding their trial of a four-day working week. This is not about the merits or otherwise of a 4-day week, but it is about local autonomy. This is a matter for a local authority alone and the government shouldn't intervene: it sets a dangerous precedent. Councils must be allowed to make their own informed decisions. The decision to serve a Best Value Notice is heavy-handed and tantamount to bullying. The council must now answer up to 80 questions totalling 186 individual requests from government every week, which will be very time-consuming and costly to do. They also have to provide cost and performance data going back to 2018. It is a misuse of the Best Value Notice process and no evidence that one is necessary has been provided. Councillor Smith was very grateful for our support and thanked us for what she said was an incredibly kind and helpful letter.

You will have received an email from Councillor James Giles of the Royal Borough of Kingston at the weekend asking you to sign a letter regarding the situation in Gaza on behalf of an organisation called Councillors for a Ceasefire. The tone of the email has caused a lot of worry and fear for many, and the LGA chairman, Councillor Shaun Davies, has sent out an urgent message reassuring us that no contact data was supplied by the LGA. However, I know that some of you are concerned by the small print at the end of the email, which states 'You are receiving this email because you opted in via our website', and I have written to Councillor Shaun Davies to seek clarification. This is further complicated by Councillor Giles sending his email from his Kingston email address. I will update you when I have further information."

64.3 Councillor Holt commented that not all Members were consulted on the letter sent to South Cambridgeshire District Council and requested or this to happen for future correspondence to confirm Members' agreement.

**Question 1** 

Councillor Beer to Councillor Sallie Davies, Cabinet Member for Planning

Our mission is to "Provide strong, proud and inspirational leadership; striving for excellence, and together building great communities for everyone to live, work, visit and invest in".

Can the Cabinet Member please inform us how many homes have the Planning Committee approved for construction since 4<sup>th</sup> May 2023 and similarly how many had been occupied?

## Response from Councillor Sallie Davies, Cabinet Member for Planning

Babergh's Planning Committee have had 2 applications for housing since the election in May 2023, one for a single dwelling and one for 43 dwellings, both were refused. However, we have issued planning permission for over 800 dwellings since the election and planning officers under delegated powers have approved 64 dwellings.

## Supplementary question from Councillor Beer

If we have not approved any since May, I believe in our policy it is 416 that Babergh is expected to provide towards the Governments total, is this correct and at the rate we are going on is this a minimum because the 880 are nothing to do with the question asked.

## **Response from Councillor Sallie Davies**

It's not that we haven't approved any since the elections, Planning Officers have approved 64 dwellings since the election. For the year April to March 2023 there were over 600 completions, that's against the annual requirement of 416 as you rightly said. Picking up the second part of your question about occupation, we've seen 347 homes completed for occupation since the election.

### Question 2

## Councillor Riley to Councillor Ward, Acting Leader of the Council

Babergh-Mid Suffolk are advertising for a political assistant to support the new Green Party administration at an exciting time for Mid Suffolk District Council.

Would you kindly confirm that no costs for this post will fall upon the taxpayers and residents of Babergh District Council and that any recruitment by Babergh District Council for a similar post will come to full council for approval prior to the post being advertised.

## Response from Councillor Ward, Acting Leader of the Council

In response to the first part of your question, although the two Councils are working together in a very successful partnership, we are separate Councils with our own budgets and spending programmes. The political assistant is solely a Mid Suffolk matter and will be covered within their budget.

No part of it will be financed by Babergh. Just as the Mid Suffolk report went to their Council in September, the same would apply to us should it be proposed at Babergh. I must stress at this point that we have no plans to follow. I am not convinced of its value and we can't afford it.

## 68 BC/23/27 BABERGH AND MID SUFFOLK JOINT LOCAL DEVELOPMENT SCHEME 2023-2026

- 68.1 The Chair invited Councillor Sallie Davies, Cabinet Member for Planning, to introduce Paper BC/23/27, Babergh and Mid Suffolk Joint Local Development Scheme 2023-2026.
- 68.2 Councillor Sallie Davies introduced the report to Members and provided an overview of the contents of the report including the supplementary planning documents. Councillor Davies then **PROPOSED** the recommendations as detailed in the report.
- 68.3 Councillor Ward **SECONDED** the recommendations.
- 68.4 In response to a question from Councillor Busby regarding the completion dates for the scheme, Councillor Sallie Davies confirmed that the scheme would be submitted to the planning inspector in June 2025 and would be ready for adoption in December 2026.
- 68.5 Councillor Ward stressed the importance of the document and the amount of work which had been undertaken, he stated that a high degree of management would be required to avoid slippage in the timetable.
- 68.6 Councillor Holt commented that a lot of the details contained in the proposed scheme would have implications for both existing Neighbourhood Plans and those currently being developed. Councillor Holt urged all officers to liaise with Parish Councils to ensure they are kept up to date with all relevant information.
- 68.7 Councillor Sallie Davies assured Members that officers were aware of the importance of the timetable, and the implications for Neighbourhood Plans.

By a unanimous vote of 29 votes for.

## It was RESOLVED:

That the Babergh and Mid Suffolk Joint Local Development Scheme 2023-2026 (November 2023) (Appendix A of the report) is agreed and brought into effect from 21<sup>st</sup> November 2023 in Babergh.

#### 69 BC/23/28 BABERGH AND MID SUFFOLK JOINT LOCAL PLAN FOR ADOPTION

- 69.1 Councillor Sallie Davies, Cabinet Member for Planning, introduced Paper BC/23/28 Babergh and Mid Suffolk Joint Local Plan for Adoption, outlining the work which had taken place in preparing the plan. Councillor Sallies Davies thanked the officers involved, and the previous Cabinet Member for Planning, Councillor Clive Arthey.
- 69.2 Councillor Sallie Davies **PROPOSED** the recommendations. Councillor Ward **SECONDED** the motion.
- 69.3 Councillor Potter referred to the biodiversity net gain target and asked what, if anything, would prevent the target of 20% being achieved.
- 69.4 Councillor Sallie Davies advised that the minimum requirement for net gain in new developments was 10%, and that the Plan would seek to achieve the 20% target via the Supplementary Planning Documents on Biodiversity and Trees.
- 69.5 Councillor Riley asked whether it could be acknowledged that there would be deficit from previous years, and requested confirmation that it was the intention to make Babergh an affluent area and not living beyond its means.
- 69.6 In response, the Director for Planning and Building Control advised that the Plan aimed to deliver sustainable growth throughout the Plan period, and that the Council had delivered, through planning permissions, a significant number of the dwellings required across the Plan period, and confirmed he was confident that Babergh District Council would be able to achieve the housing needs required.
- 69.7 Councillor Holt commented that although he welcomed Part 1 of the Joint Local Plan, the plan could not be considered a success as it was incomplete and Part 2 of the Plan was still to be completed.
- 69.8 Councillor Jamieson agreed that the Plan was not perfect and had taken a considerable amount of time however he was in support of the Plan.
- 69.9 Councillor Ward highlighted the difficulty of preparing the Plan, and the examination process, and commented that the importance of the policies contained in Part 1 must not be diminished. Councillor Ward went on to state that this was a momentous moment for both Babergh and Mid Suffolk Councils and provided clarity of the planning policies. Councillor Ward expressed his gratitude to Councillor Clive Arthey for his work on the Joint Local Plan.
- 69.10 Councillor Derek Davis endorsed the comments made by Councillor Ward regarding Councillor Arthey, he commented that the next stage was to ensure that the hard work undertaken by the officers was not wasted and that Members were fully trained and using the plan to its full advantage.

- 69.11 Councillor McCraw referred to the issue of the Plan being in two parts and felt that there were advantages to this approach in that it provided time to continue developing the supplementary planning documents and enabled the current Members to contribute to these.
- 69.12 Councillor Busby raised concerns with the process, in particular the time it would take to complete Part 2 of the Plan, commenting that there was desperate need for social housing throughout the district which may not be able to be delivered through the existing approved applications.
- 69.13 Councillor Riley commented that the Council should be working with the Private Sector, and that the Plan needed to ensure that the Council was open for business and made Babergh an attractive place to be.
- 69.14 The Director for Planning and Building Control provided clarification that should the Plan be approved, this would not preclude Committee Members from granting planning permissions in accordance with the policies within Part 1 of the Plan without Part 2 being approved.
- 69.15 Councillor Beer sought assurance that better skills and employment opportunities for residents were being encouraged to enable them to afford properties in the District.
- 69.16 In response, Councillor Derek Davis, Cabinet Member for Economic Growth, advised that every effort was being made for regeneration sites to be opened, and agreed that there was a need to develop skills and provide a good level of wages to enable people to afford homes.
- 69.17 Councillor Potter welcomed the policies relating to Houseboat dwellers in Part 2 of the plan, and the policies on air quality relating to AONB sites.

By a unanimous vote of 29 votes for.

### HALF YEAR REPORT ON TREASURY MANAGEMENT 2023/24

#### 1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

- 1.1 The report is part of the Councils' management and governance arrangements for Treasury Management activity under the CIPFA Code of Practice on Treasury Management ("the Code"). It provides Members with a comprehensive assessment of activities for the first six months of the financial year 2023/24.
- 1.2 The report specifically sets out the performance of the treasury management function, the effects of the decisions taken, and the transactions executed during the first six months of 2023/24 and any circumstances of non-compliance with the Councils' treasury management policy statement and treasury management practices.

### 2. OPTIONS CONSIDERED

2.1 This report fulfils the Councils' legal obligations to have regard to the Code and there are no other options to consider.

#### 3. RECOMMENDATION TO BOTH COUNCILS

3.1 That the Treasury Management activity for the first six months of 2023/24 as set out in this report and Appendices be noted.

#### RECOMMENDATION TO BABERGH DISTRCIT COUNCIL

3.2 That it be noted that Babergh District Council's treasury management activity for the first six months of 2023/24 was in accordance with the approved Treasury Management Strategy, and that the Council has complied with all the Treasury Management Indicators for this period.

## RECOMMENDATION TO MID SUFFOLK DISTRICT COUNCIL

3.3 That it be noted that Mid Suffolk District Council's treasury management activity for the first six months of 2023/24 was in accordance with the approved Treasury Management Strategy, and that, except for one occasion when the Council exceeded its daily bank account limit with Lloyds, as mentioned in Appendix C, paragraph 4.1, the Council has complied with all the Treasury Management Indicators for this period.

#### **REASON FOR DECISION**

It is a requirement of the Code of Practice on Treasury Management that full Council notes the Half-Year position.

#### 4. KEY INFORMATION

- 4.1 The 2023/24 Treasury Management Strategy for both Councils was approved in February 2023.
- 4.2 The Strategy and activities are affected by several factors, including the regulatory framework, economic conditions, best practice and interest rate/liquidity risk. The attached appendices summarise the regulatory framework, economic background and information on key activities for the first six months of 2023/24.
- 4.3 The Half year report on treasury management 2023/24 was presented to Members at the Joint Audit and Standards Committee on 27 November 2023. Members agreed with the following recommendations;
  - It was Recommended to Babergh Council: -
    - That it be noted that Babergh District Council's treasury management activity for the first six months of 2023/24 was in accordance with the approved Treasury Management Strategy, and that the Council has complied with all the Treasury Management Indicators for this period.

#### And

- It was Recommended to Mid Suffolk Council: -
  - That it be noted that Mid Suffolk District Council's treasury management activity for the first six months of 2023/24 was in accordance with the approved Treasury Management Strategy, and that, except for one occasion when the Council exceeded its daily bank account limit with Lloyds, as mentioned in Appendix C, paragraph 4.1, the Council has complied with all the Treasury Management Indicators for this period. 3205.81
- 4.4 The Section 151 Officer is pleased to report that all treasury management activities undertaken in the first half of the year complied fully with the CIPFA Code of Practice and the Councils' approved Treasury Management Strategy and that both Councils have complied with all the Treasury Management Indicators for this period.
- 4.5 The Treasury Management Indicators aim to ensure that the capital investments of local authorities are affordable, prudent, and sustainable and that treasury management decisions are taken in accordance with good professional practice.
- 4.6 Appendix D shows the position on key Treasury Management Indicators for the first six months of 2023/24.
- 4.7 Key points relating to activity for the first half of the year are set out below:

- The economic backdrop during the April 2023 to September 2023 continued to be characterised by ongoing high inflation and its impact on consumers' cost of living, high interest rates and flat GDP.
- July 2023 data showed that the unemployment rate increased to 4.3% (3mth/year) while the employment rate rose to 75.5%. Pay growth was 8.5% for total pay (including bonuses) and 7.8% for regular pay, which for the latter was the highest recorded annual growth rate. Adjusting for inflation, pay growth in real terms were positive at 1.2% and 0.6% for total pay and regular pay respectively.
- Consumer confidence continued to fall in October 2023, reaching -30 from -21 in September 2023, very low levels seen in that indicator as the outlook for the economy weakens over the coming years.
- In November 2023 the Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) decided to keep bank rates stable at 5.25%. With the decision being a majority 6-3 to maintain rates, this supports the view that we may now be at the peak for Bank Rate, but the MPC were keen to reemphasise that rates will likely remain high for the foreseeable future until inflation is closer to the 2% target.
- UK Inflation continued to fall from its peak as annual headline CPI declined to 6.7% in July 2023 from 6.8% in the previous month against expectations for a tick back up to 7.0%.
- Investment of surplus funds As market conditions, credit ratings and bank ringfencing have changed during the year, institutions that the Councils invest with, and the period of the investments have been reviewed.
- Credit risk scores were within the benchmark A- credit ratings.
- Babergh's overall debt reduced by £9.2m, mainly due to repaying short-term local authority loans.
- Mid Suffolk's overall debt reduced by £10.1m, due to receipts of money from Gateway 14 Ltd.
- 4.8 Money market funds, short-term deposits and call accounts are used to make short term investments on a daily basis.
- 4.9 Appendix A sets out the issues that are impacting on current and future treasury management activity.

### 7. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

7.1 The legal status of the Treasury Management Code derives in England from regulations issued under the Local Government Act 2003 (the 2003 Act).

- 7.2 Local authorities are required by regulation to have regard to the Prudential Code when carrying out their duties under Part 1 of the 2003 Act.
- 7.3 The latest statutory guidance on local government investments was issued under section 15(1)(a) of the 2003 Act and effective for financial years commencing on or after 1 April 2018. Under that section local authorities "shall have regard to such guidance as the Secretary of State may issue".

## **Background, Economy and Outlook**

#### 1. Introduction

- 1.1 In February 2012 both Councils adopted the Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy's *Treasury Management in the Public Services: Code of Practice* (the CIPFA Code) which requires the Councils to approve treasury management half year and annual reports.
- 1.2 This report includes the new requirement in the 2021 Code, mandatory from 1st April 2023, of quarterly reporting of the treasury management prudential indicators. The non-treasury prudential indicators are incorporated in the Councils normal quarterly financial monitoring report.
- 1.3 The Joint Treasury Management Strategy for 2023/24 was approved at both full Councils in January 2023. Both Councils have borrowed and invested substantial sums of money and are therefore exposed to financial risks including the loss of invested funds and the revenue effect of changing interest rates. The successful identification, monitoring and control of risk are therefore central to the Councils Treasury Management Strategy.

### 2. External Context

### 2.1 **Economic background:**

- 2.2 UK inflation remained stubbornly high over much the period compared to the US and euro zone, keeping expectations elevated of how much further the Bank of England (BoE) would hike rates compared to the regions. However, inflation data published in the latter part of the period undershot expectations, causing financial markets to reassess the peak in BoE Bank Rate. This was followed very soon after by the BoE deciding to keep Bank Rate on hold at 5.25% in September 2023, against expectation for another 0.25% rise.
- 2.3 Economic growth in the UK remained relatively weak over the period. In calendar Q2 2023, the economy expanded by 0.2%. However, monthly GDP data showed a 0.5% contraction in July, the largest fall to date in 2023 and worse than the 0.2% decline predicted which could be an indication the monetary tightening cycle is starting to cause recessionary or at the very least stagnating economic conditions.
- 2.4 July 2023 data showed the unemployment rate increased to 4.3% (3mth/year) while the employment rate rose to 75.5%. Pay growth was 8.5% for total pay (including bonuses) and 7.8% for regular pay, which for the latter was the highest recorded annual growth rate. Adjusting for inflation, pay growth in real terms were positive at 1.2% and 0.6% for total pay and regular pay respectively.
- 2.5 Inflation continued to fall from its peak as annual headline CPI declined to 6.7% in July 2023 from 6.8% in the previous month against expectations for a tick back up to 7.0%. The largest downward contribution came from food prices. The core rate also surprised on the downside, falling to 6.2% from 6.9% compared to predictions for it to only edge down to 6.8%

- 2.6 The Bank of England's Monetary Policy Committee continued tightening monetary policy over most of the period, taking Bank Rate to 5.25% in August 2023. Against expectations of a further hike in September 2023, the Committee voted 5-4 to maintain Bank Rate at 5.25%. Each of the four dissenters were in favour of another 0.25% increase.
- 2.7 Financial market Bank Rate expectations moderated over the period as falling inflation and weakening data gave some indication that higher interest rates were working. Expectations fell from predicting a peak of over 6% in June 2023 to 5.5% just ahead of the September 2023 MPC meeting, and to then expecting 5.25% to be the peak by the end of the period.
- 2.8 Following the September 2023 MPC meeting, Arlingclose, the Councils treasury adviser, modestly revised its interest forecast to reflect the central view that 5.25% will now be the peak in Bank Rate. In the short term the risks are to the upside if inflation increases again, but over the remaining part of the time horizon the risks are to the downside from economic activity weakening more than expected.
- 2.9 The European Central Bank increased its key deposit, main refinancing, and marginal lending interest rates to 4.00%, 4.50% and 4.75% respectively in September 2023, and hinted these levels may represent the peak in rates but also emphasising rates would stay high for as long as required to bring inflation down to target.
- 2.10 Although continuing to decline steadily, inflation has been sticky, Eurozone annual headline CPI fell to 5.2% in August 2023 while annual core inflation eased to 5.3% having stuck at 5.5% in the previous two months. GDP growth remains weak, with recent data showing the region expanded by only 0.1% in the three months to June 2023, the rate as the previous quarter.

#### 2.11 Financial markets:

- 2.12 Financial market sentiment and bond yields remained volatile, with the latter generally trending downwards as there were signs inflation, while still high, was moderating and interest rates were at a peak.
- 2.13 Gilt yields fell towards the end of the period. The 5-year UK benchmark gilt yield rose from 3.30% to peak at 4.91% in July 2023 before trending downwards to 4.29%, the 10-year gilt yield rose from 3.43% to 4.75% in August 2023 before declining to 4.45%, and the 20-year yield from 3.75% to 4.97% in August 2023 and then fell back to 4.84%. The Sterling Overnight Rate (SONIA) averaged 4.73% over the period.

## 2.14 Credit background:

2.15 Having completed a review of its credit advice on unsecured deposits at UK and non-UK banks following concerns of a wider financial crisis after the collapse of Silicon Valley Bank purchase of Credit Suisse by UBS, as well as other well-publicised banking sector issues, in March 2023 Arlingclose reduced the advised maximum duration limit for all banks on its recommended counterparty list to 35 days. This stance continued to be maintained at the end of the period.

- 2.16 During the second quarter of the period, Moody's revised the outlook on Svenska Handelsbanken to negative from stable, citing concerns around the Swedish real estate sector.
- 2.17 Having put the US sovereign rating on Rating Watch Negative earlier in the period, Fitch took further action in August, downgrading the long-term rating to AA+, partly around ongoing debt ceiling concerns but also an expected fiscal deterioration over the next couple of years.
- 2.18 Following the issue of a Section 114 notice, in September 2023 Arlingclose advised against undertaking new lending to Birmingham City Council, and later in the month cut its recommended duration on Warrington Borough Council to a maximum of 100 days
- 2.19 Arlingclose continued to monitor and assess credit default swap levels for signs of ongoing credit stress and although no changes were made to recommended durations over the period, Northern Trust Corporation was added to the counterparty list.
- 2.20 Heightened market volatility is expected to remain a feature, at least in the near term and, as ever, the institutions and durations on the Council's counterparty list recommended by Arlingclose remains under constant review.

## 3 Outlook for the remainder of 2023/24: (based on data of 10th November 2023)

- 3.1 In November 2023 the MPC decided to keep bank rates stable at 5.25%. With the decision being a majority 6-3 to maintain rates, this supports the view that we may now be at the peak for Bank Rate, but the MPC were keen to reemphasise that rates will likely remain high for the foreseeable future until inflation is closer to the 2% target.
- 3.2 Arlingclose, believes that cuts in the Bank Rate will not come in until late 2024, with a caveat that a recession may increase pressure on the MPC to cut rates further, potentially as low as 3% depending on how the economy develops.
- 3.3 This decision came alongside an updated Monetary Policy Report, which documented the MPC's expectation that GDP will remain mostly flat until 2024 but well below the historic average in the medium term. Unemployment is expected to rise over the next few years with 5% being the central case but the risk range reaching as high as 8%. There is still significant uncertainty around the CPI forecast and how long it will take to return to the 2% target, but the MPC have suggested that it will not be before late 2024.

### 4 Background:

- 4.1 The UK Economy avoided falling into negative territory in Q3 by the smallest of margins. Despite this, September GDP grew by 0.2% belying the downwards quarterly trend, led by widespread weakness in the domestic economy; consumer, Government and business spending all declined in Q3, while net trade increased.
- 4.2 The money supply contracted from -0.6% in August to -4.2% in September 2023 as the effects of higher Bank Rates weigh on activity. On the credit side of things, there was less mortgage lending than repayments made which means there was an

- overall fall in the amount of credit available in that sector. Consumer credit eased from £1.7bn in August 2023 to £1.4bn in September 2023.
- 4.3 Consumer confidence continued to fall in October 2023, reaching -30 from -21 in September 2023, very low levels seen in that indicator as the outlook for the economy weakens over the coming years.
- 4.4 Elsewhere in the world the US's Federal Reserve chose to keep the interest rate stable at its November 2023 meeting, in line with decisions made by the UK and the ECB. Although the USA has a much lower rate of inflation as they are less beholden to external supply factors putting upward pressure on inflation, there is still work to be done after a string of strong economic data and labour market indicators.
- 4.5 Arlingclose Forecast rates (based on data of 8th November 2023)

#### 5 Local Context

- 5.1 On 31 March 2023, Babergh had a net borrowing requirement of £112m and Mid Suffolk had a net borrowing requirement of £106m arising from revenue and capital income and expenditure.
- 5.2 The underlying need to borrow for capital purposes is measured by the Capital Financing Requirement (CFR), while usable reserves and working capital are the underlying resources available for investment. These factors are summarised in Table 1 that follows.

- 5.4 Higher official interest rates have increased the cost of short-term, temporary loans and investment returns from cash assets that can be used in lieu of borrowing. The current strategy is to maintain borrowing and investments below their underlying levels, sometimes known as internal borrowing, in order to reduce risk and keep interest costs low.
- 5.5 The treasury management position on 30 September 2023 and the change during the half year is shown in Table 2.

## 1 Borrowing Strategy

- 1.1 On 30 September 2023 Babergh held £115.6m of loans, a decrease of £9.3m and Mid Suffolk held £112.7m of loans, a decrease of £10.1m since 31 March 2023.
- 1.2 Babergh has reduced net overall borrowing by making repayments on long term Public Works Loan Board (PWLB) loans and by repaying short-term local authority loans.
- 1.3 Mid Suffolk has reduced net overall borrowing by making repayments on long term PWLB loans and repaying both medium-term and short-term loans with other local authorities.
- 1.4 The borrowing position on 30 September 2023 is shown in Table 3.





Table 3 - Charts - The Councils' Borrowing Portfolios on 30 September 2023:



- 1.6 The Councils chief objective when borrowing has been to strike an appropriately low risk balance between securing low interest costs and achieving cost certainty over the period for which funds are required, with the secondary objective of having flexibility to renegotiate loans should the Councils' long-term plans change. The Councils borrowing strategy continues to address the key issue of affordability without compromising the longer-term stability of the debt portfolio.
- 1.7 There was a substantial rise in the cost of both short- and long-term borrowing over the last 18 months. Bank Rate rose by 1% from 4.25% at the beginning of April to 5.25% at the end of September 2023. Bank Rate was 2% higher than at the end of September 2022.
- 1.8 UK gilt yields were volatile, mainly facing upward pressure since early April following signs that UK growth had been more resilient, inflation stickier than expected, and

that the Bank of England saw persistently higher rates through 2023/24 as key to dampening domestic demand. Gilt yields, and consequently PWLB borrowing rates, rose and broadly remained at elevated levels. On 30th September 2023, the PWLB certainty rates for maturity loans were 5.26% for 10-year loans, 5.64% for 20-year loans and 5.43% for 50-year loans. Their equivalents on 31st March 2023 were 4.33%, 4.70% and 4.41% respectively.

- 1.9 A new PWLB HRA rate which is 0.4% below the certainty rate was made available from 15th June 2023. Initially available for a period of one year, this discounted rate is to support local authorities borrowing for the Housing Revenue Account and for refinancing existing HRA loans.
- 1.10 The Treasury Management Strategy shows that, as at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2023 Babergh's CFR has continued to increase when compared to the previous year whilst Mid Suffolk's has decreased in the same period. The estimated net borrowing requirements for both councils are outlined at various points further on in this document.
- 1.11 Both Councils repaid medium-term and short-term borrowing in the period.
- 1.12 LOBO loans: Mid Suffolk continues to hold £4m of LOBO (Lender's Option Borrower's Option) loans where the lender has the option to propose an increase in the interest rate at set dates, following which the Council has the option to either accept the new rate or to repay the loan at no additional cost. No banks exercised their option during the first half of 2023/24.

## 2 Borrowing Update

- 2.1 CIPFA's 2021 Prudential Code is clear that local authorities must not borrow to invest primarily for financial return and that it is not prudent for local authorities to make any investment or spending decision that will increase the capital financing requirement, and so may lead to new borrowing, unless directly and primarily related to the functions of the Councils.
- 2.2 PWLB loans are no longer available to local authorities planning to buy investment assets primarily for yield. The Councils are not planning to purchase any investment assets primarily for yield within the next three years and so are able to fully access the PWLB.
- 2.3 Acceptable use of PWLB borrowing includes service delivery, housing, regeneration, preventative action, refinancing, and treasury management.
- 2.4 Competitive market alternatives may be available for authorities with or without access to the PWLB. However, the financial strength of the individual authority and borrowing purpose will be scrutinised by commercial lenders.

### **Revised PWLB Guidance**

2.5 HM Treasury published further guidance on PWLB borrowing in August 2021 providing additional detail and clarifications predominantly around the definition of an 'investment asset primarily for yield'. The principal aspects of the new guidance are:

- Capital expenditure incurred or committed to before 26 November 2020 is allowable even for an 'investment asset primarily for yield'.
- Capital plans should be submitted by local authorities via a DELTA return.
   These open for the new financial year on 1 March and remain open all year.
   Returns must be updated if there is a change of more than 10%.
- An asset held primarily to generate yield that serves no direct policy purpose should not be categorised as service delivery.
- Further detail on how local authorities purchasing investment assets primarily for yield can access the PWLB for the purposes of refinancing existing loans or externalising internal borrowing.
- Additional detail on the sanctions which can be imposed for inappropriate use
  of the PWLB loan. These can include a request to cancel projects, restrictions
  to accessing the PLWB and requests for information on further plans.

## 1 Treasury Investment Activity


- 1.1 CIPFA revised TM Code defines treasury management investments as those which arise from the Councils cash flows or treasury risk management activity that ultimately represents balances which need to be invested until the cash is required for use in the course of business.
- 1.2 Babergh and Mid Suffolk hold invested funds, representing income received in advance of expenditure plus balances and reserves held. During the first half of 2023/24, Babergh's investment balances ranged between £12.5m and £23.3m. Mid Suffolk's investment balances ranged between £11.2m and £25.1m. These movements are due to timing differences between income and expenditure.
- 1.3 The investment position and weighted average rates during the first six months of the year is shown in Table 4.



## 1.5 The Councils' Investment Portfolios on 30 September 2023:





- 1.6 Both the CIPFA Code and government guidance requires the Councils to invest their funds prudently, and to have regard to the security and liquidity of their treasury investments before seeking the optimum rate of return, or yield. The Councils objective when investing money is to strike an appropriate balance between risk and return, minimising the risk of incurring losses from defaults and the risk of receiving unsuitably low investment income.
- 1.7 Bank Rate increased by 1%, from 4.25% at the beginning of April 2023 to 5.25% by the end of September 2023. Short-dated cash rates rose commensurately, with 3-month rates rising to around 5.25% and 12-month rates to nearly 6%.

- 1.8 The rates on DMADF deposits also rose, ranging between 4.8% and 5.4% by the end of June 2023 and Money Market Rates between 3.98% and 4.09% in April and between 5.19% and 5.35% by the end of September 2023.
- 1.9 Neither Council made further investments in strategic pooled funds (e.g.pooled property, multi asset and equity funds) during the period.
- 1.10 The average rate of return is significantly higher than the comparable average returns of Arlingclose's other clients, as shown in Table 5. The progression of risk and return metrics are shown in the extracts from Arlingclose's quarterly investment benchmarking.

- 1.12 Bail-in involves the shareholders and creditors of a failing financial institution meeting the costs, instead of the government. Babergh and Mid Suffolk have a higher proportion of investments in strategic pooled funds compared to total investments, so their bail-in exposure is proportionately higher than the local authorities in Arlingclose's benchmarking group. Babergh and Mid Suffolk have chosen to adopt a strategy of generating higher returns by investing funds available in banks and strategic pooled funds.
- 1.13 Each Council has £11m of externally managed strategic pooled equity, property and multi assets funds where short-term security and liquidity are lesser considerations, and the primary objectives instead are regular revenue income and long-term price stability. Since the date of the initial investments, these have generated a total

income return, used to support service provision, of £3.68m for Babergh and £3.53m for Mid Suffolk. Both Councils have achieved an average rate of return for the period of 3.93%.

- 1.14 These pooled funds have no defined maturity date but are available for withdrawal after a notice period. Their performance and continued suitability in meeting the Councils' investment objectives are regularly reviewed. Strategic fund investments are made in the knowledge that capital values will move both up and down on months, quarters and even years, but with the confidence that over a three to five-year period total returns will exceed cash interest rates. Investment in these funds has been maintained during the first six months of the year.
- 1.15 Since 2018/19, the International Financial Reporting Standards for pooled funds states that changes in valuations must be taken through the general fund. A statutory override was granted until 2022/23 so these changes will have no impact on the "bottom line" until 2023/24.
- 1.16 The Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) undertook a consultation on the status of the statutory override between August and October 2022. Under the override, fair value movements in the value of pooled funds are recorded by local authorities in an unusable reserve rather than in the general fund.
- 1.17 DLUHC announced the outcome of the consultation on 6th April 2023. The override was extended until 31st March 2025, but no other changes were made. Whether the override will be extended beyond the new end date is unknown but in the commentary to the consultation outcome the following statement suggests that may not be the case: "The government expects authorities to carefully consider their current and future investments, including whether volatility and risk can be managed without detriment to service delivery and sustainability, while complying with proper accounting practices". The Councils will keep their investment position under review.
- 1.18 It would be prudent to set aside any increases in valuation to a reserve to mitigate future potential losses. These pooled funds are long term investments, and the Councils should not consider selling the units whilst their value is less than the original investment.

## 2 Long Term investments – Pooled Fund Performance

- 2.1 Financial market conditions were volatile during the six-month period. Global bond yields rose and remained elevated as it became apparent that policymakers were looking to keep rates high for some time amid persistently higher core inflation and tight labour markets.
- 2.2 The UK, Euro area and US equity markets were initially helped by resilient growth data and diminishing talk of recession. A weaker currency and better-than-expected fundamentals were broadly supportive for UK equities. However, the global outlook was clouded by the slowdown in China. The FTSE All Share index fell marginally from 4157 on 31st March 2023 to 4127 on 30th September 2023, whilst the MSCI World Index rose from 2791 to 2853 over the same period. The changes in equity valuations are reflected in the equity and multi-asset income funds.

- 2.3 The capital value of the property fund is slightly below that on 31 March 2023. Market values of all the pooled funds on 31 March 2023 and 30 September 2023 are as shown in the tables 6.1 to 6.5.
- 2.4 The Councils objective is to retain these investments in pooled funds to generate an income return. These are long-term investments and would only be redeemed when capital growth had been achieved. Table 6 that follows is a summary of performance by fund from initial investment date until the most recent return valuation available and details of interest received.

# 2.5 **Pooled Fund Performance**

2.6 Both Councils invested £5m each into the CCLA Local Authority Property Fund. Babergh purchased 1.657m units on 31 August 2015 and Mid Suffolk 1.632m units on 29 October 2015. The valuations are based on the number of units owned.

# 3 Non-Treasury Holdings and Other Investment Activity

- 3.1 The definition of investments in CIPFA's revised 2021 Treasury Management Code covers all the financial assets of the Councils as well as other non-financial assets which the Councils hold primarily for financial return.
- 3.2 Investments that do not meet the definition of treasury management investments (i.e., management of surplus cash) are categorised as either for service purposes (made explicitly to further service objectives) and or for commercial purposes (made primarily for financial return).

3.3 Investment Guidance issued by the Department for Levelling Up Housing and Communities (DLUHC) also includes within the definition of investments all such assets held partially or wholly for financial return.

# **Investment Property**

On 5 August 2016 Babergh purchased Borehamgate Shopping centre in Sudbury for £3.56m. This has been classified as an investment property and at 31 March 2023, it was assessed at Fair Value of £2.60m.

# **Trading Companies**

- 3.5 Babergh holds £5m of equity in Babergh Holdings Ltd and Mid Suffolk holds the same in Mid Suffolk Holdings Ltd.
- 3.6 The Capital Investment Fund Company (CIFCO Ltd) is a jointly owned subsidiary of both Babergh Holdings Ltd and Mid Suffolk Holdings Ltd (50% each) and both Councils have loans of £44.7m in CIFCO Ltd. These loans have generated £9.16m (gross) of investment income for each Council since the initial loans were given. The Councils have not given any additional loans to CIFCO Ltd since March 2021, and there is not expected to be further loans from the Councils.
- 3.7 Mid Suffolk also holds £1.622m of equity and £3.08m of loans in another subsidiary of Mid Suffolk Holdings Ltd, Gateway 14 Ltd, which has generated £5.01m of investment income since 13 August 2018. Gateway 14 Ltd is on track to repay fully its loan facility in December 2023 and it is anticipated that no further lending will be required.
- 3.8 Mid Suffolk holds £1.26m of loans in another subsidiary of Mid Suffolk Holdings Ltd, Mid Suffolk Growth Ltd.
- 3.9 Table 7 that follows shows details of the interest receivable from the companies on loans to them from the Councils. The initial loans were paid to CIFCO Ltd in December 2018 and to Gateway 14 Ltd in August 2018. Interest payable is due on loans that the Councils have taken out to finance the loans to the companies.

# 4 Compliance Report

4.1 The Section 151 Officer can report that all treasury management activities undertaken complied fully with the CIPFA Code of Practice and the Councils approved Treasury Management Strategy, except for one occasion, on 5 July 2023, when Mid Suffolk's bank account balance went above the limit by £967k due to an unexpected capital receipt received too late in the day for the additional balance to be invested.

# 1 Treasury Management Indicators

- 1.1 The Councils measure and manage their exposure to treasury management risks using the following indicators.
- 1.2 **Security:** The Councils have adopted a voluntary measure of exposure to credit risk by monitoring the value-weighted average credit score of their investment portfolios. This is calculated by applying a score to each investment (AAA=1, AA+=2, etc.) and taking the arithmetic average, weighted by the size of each investment. Unrated investments are assigned a score based on their perceived risk.



# **Glossary of Terms**

BPS	Base Points. A unit of percentage measure equal to 0.01%. Basis points are commonly used when discussing changes to interest rates, equity indices, and fixed-income securities.
CDS	Credit Default Swap. In effect, insurance against non-payment. Through a CDS, the buyer can mitigate the risk of their investment by shifting all or a portion of that risk onto an insurance company or other CDS seller in exchange for a periodic fee. In this way, the buyer of a credit default swap receives credit protection, whereas the seller of the swap guarantees the credit worthiness of the debt security.
CFR	Capital Financing Requirement. The underlying need to borrow to finance capital expenditure.
CIPFA	The Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy. This is the leading professional accountancy body for public services.
CPI	Consumer Price Index. This measures changes in the price level of consumer goods and services purchased by households.
CPIH	Consumer Price Index Housing. A measure of consumer price inflation including a measure of owner occupiers' housing costs (OOH).
CCLA	Churches, Charities and Local Authority Property Fund
DLUHC	A Government department – The Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (formerly known as the MHCLG)
DMADF	Debt Management Account Deposit Facility.
Funding Circle	Accounts set up to lend money to local and national businesses at competitive rates
GDP	Gross Domestic Product. This is the market value of all officially recognised goods and services produced within a country in a given period of time.
HRA	Housing Revenue Account. The statutory account to which revenue costs are charged for providing, maintaining and managing Council dwellings. These costs are financed by tenants' rents.
Investec Ninety-One	Investec Ninety-One Diversified Income Fund
LIBID	London Interbank Bid Rate. The interest rate at which banks bid to take short-term deposits from other banks in the London interbank market.
LOBO	Lender's Option Borrower's Option. This is a loan where the lender has certain dates when they can increase the interest rate payable and, if they do, the Council has the option of accepting the new rate or repaying the loan.
LVNAV	Low Volatility Net Asset Value. A new type of Low Volatility Net Asset Value Money Market Fund - a new fund category introduced as part of a new regulatory reform of the sector in Europe.

MHCLG	A Government department – The Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government
MiFID	The Markets in Financial Instruments Directive (2014/65/EU) (MiFID II). The EU legislation that regulates firms who provide services to clients linked to 'financial instruments' (shares, bonds, units in collective investment schemes and derivatives), and the venues where those instruments are traded.
MPC	Monetary Policy Committee. A committee of the Bank of England which decides the Bank of England's Base Rate and other aspects of the Government's Monetary Policy.
MRP	Minimum Revenue Provision. Local authorities are required to make a prudent provision for debt redemption on General Fund borrowing
NAV	Net Asset Value. The NAV is the value of a fund's assets less the value of its liabilities on a per unit basis.
PWLB	Public Works Loan Board - offers loans to local authorities below marker rates.
QE	Quantitative Easing. The purchase of Government bonds by the Bank of England to boost the money supply.
Schroder	Schroder Income Maximiser Fund
SONIA	Sterling Overnight Index Average. The average of the interest rates that banks pay to borrow sterling overnight from other financial institutions and other institutional investors.

# **OUR PLAN FOR BABERGH**

# 1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

- 1.1 Set out in this report are the refreshed priorities for Babergh, that we have collectively identified in communication with our communities, businesses and partners. In October we set out our draft priorities to Cabinet and intent to engage with different people, groups and sectors.
- 1.2 Our Plan for Babergh sets out the approach we intend to take to help create a resilient, more sustainable future, with and for, all residents and communities of Babergh. We are ambitious for our communities, but also we recognise we need to be financially sound in challenging financial circumstances for local authorities.
- 1.3 This report sets out how we went about that engagement, the feedback we received and how we have taken onboard that feedback. This has enabled us to develop our final refreshed priorities for the next eight years, which are set out in Appendix A. This gives us our vision, direction and accountability for what we will deliver for our communities in the next four years, and into the longer term.
- 1.4 These priorities were agreed by Cabinet earlier in January, and now they are presented to Full Council to agree adoption of Our Plan for Babergh.

# 2. OPTIONS CONSIDERED

- 2.1 Options considered include:
- 2.1.1 No plan: This was not pursued as there are new challenges for our districts that the Council needs to respond to within its refreshed plan.
- 2.1.2 Plan adopted with no amendments from draft version: This option was not chosen as valuable feedback and insight was provided by stakeholders during the engagement that we wish to reflect in the final plan.
- 2.1.3 Joint plan with Mid Suffolk: It is important for our communities to see how we are reacting to the challenges facing our district. Whilst there are commonalities with Mid Suffolk and their published priorities, we first want to ensure we have a representation of the challenge and opportunities facing Babergh.
- 2.1.4 Respond to feedback from the engagement and amend plan to reflect, to ensure the priorities identified consider the valuable insight shared during this engagement.

# 3. RECOMMENDATION

3.1 To accept the recommendation from Cabinet to adopt Our Plan for Babergh, setting out the vision, approach and strategic priorities for Babergh District Council for 2023-2031 (Appendix A).

# **REASON FOR DECISION**

To set a clear direction of travel for the Council to 2031.

# 4. KEY INFORMATION

- 4.1 The refreshed plan sets out the new vision and strategic priorities of the Council. At Cabinet in October we identified and agreed the priorities that were most important to us with a view to seek the views of our communities, businesses, stakeholders and partners on these.
- 4.2 Informing these draft priorities was insight we had received from our communities and partners in the months and years running up to our successful election in May. Our annual State of the District Report for Babergh, considered at Full Council in September, also sets out the issues facing our district using data and insight. Following on from these, we have sought feedback from our communities, businesses, partners and our own staff on these priorities to find out their views and opinions, alongside the completion of our annual Resident's Survey.




Figure 1: Contributors to the plan

- 4.3 Engagement happened between 4<sup>th</sup> October to 15<sup>th</sup> November, during which time an online survey was live and promoted with our public sector partners in Suffolk, Town and Parish Councils, on our social media channels, to our businesses, Voluntary, Community, Social and Faith (VCSF) sector organisations and own members of staff. Events, meetings and community conversations were held with a number of the above as well, including conversations with organisations or individuals who represented our seldom heard voices to ensure we achieved the most representative view we could of our communities.
- 4.4 Across our social media campaign, 22,600 people viewed our 'Have you say' posts. 1014 responses were received to the engagement in total, which included 540 responses on Babergh priorities. This response rate benchmarked well compared to similar engagement other councils have recently undertaken. The response rate for the whole population may be low, but the rate is in line with what would usually be expected for engagement on this more strategic discussion. There were also some low response rates from some areas, including businesses and the VCSF sector, but an ongoing commitment is in place to continue the conversation with these groups moving forward. The number of responses was large enough for us to be assured that we have received the full breadth of views across the district.




Figure 2: Overview of engagement feedback and recommendations

4.5 The outcome of this engagement and data is shown in summary in Figure 2 below. Whilst feedback broadly supported the priorities, the approach to achieving these priorities could benefit from clarity.

- 4.6 Following this engagement feedback, it was clear that how we approach these priorities was vital. To address this feedback amendments have been made as follows;
- 4.6.1 Ensuring we provide core service delivery, in a financially responsible way;
- 4.6.2 Respond to challenges (such as extreme weather events, a pandemic, international events that impact on our communities and economy) and build in the ability to reflect on such challenges through our Annual Delivery Plan;
- 4.6.3 Ensuring we are clear that we can directly deliver some priorities, but others we can only work in partnership to influence others to deliver.
- 4.7 We also have the commitment to ensure we are delivering through the development of appropriate performance targets for these priorities. These will be developed and reported through the Annual Delivery Plan.
- 4.8 A key focus of the plan is sustainability. From sustaining core services to ensuring our actions create the most sustainable future for our residents and communities. Sustainability has a different meaning in different contexts. It can mean ensuring something is maintained to the same level (e.g. service provision) to having the most minimal impact to avoid depletion of a resource (e.g. biodiversity). As the priorities develop through the Annual Delivery Plan, the concept of sustainability will be explored further to articulate this into real outcomes for our district.

- 4.9 The final plan (Appendix A) reflects the feedback we received through our engagement, forming an excellent foundation to move forward from, provide direction, clarity to our communities and our staff, and accountability to deliver on these strategic priorities for the next eight years.
- 4.10 These priorities were agreed by Cabinet earlier in January, and are now presented to Full Council with the recommendation to agree adoption of Our Plan for Babergh.

# 5. LINKS TO CORPORATE PLAN

5.1 This is the refresh of the previous corporate plan, providing new strategic priorities for the Council moving forward over the next eight years.

# 6. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

6.1 The plan identifies priorities to be delivered over the next four to eight years. There will be financial implications from the delivery of these priorities, but the priorities will need to be developed further into specific outcomes to be able to determine the budget associated with these. And indeed, as identified in the foreword to the plan, the council is facing a challenging financial situation and will need to respond accordingly. The plan identifies in the next steps that we will develop an annual delivery plan to target activity in relation to each of the three areas of focus. Budgetary information will be considered at this stage and as decisions are made by Cabinet and Council on delivering these outcomes.

# 7. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

7.1 There are no legal implications from this report. Core services will continue to be delivered, with a focus for new strategic priorities provided.

# 10. EQUALITY ANALYSIS

- 10.1 An Equality Impact Assessment (EIA) initial screening has been completed. This determined that a full EIA was not required. Our Plan for Babergh will guide the council's actions and activities over the next eight years, but how the council goes about those activities will provide the detail that can be subject to scrutiny for impact on those with protected characteristics. None of the strategic priorities directly or indirectly disadvantage any protected group. But ensuring later strategies, projects and programmes are appropriately assessed will ensure no adverse impact on any groups with protected characteristics.
- 10.2 In addition, in development of the final plan, engagement has been undertaken with our communities including groups representing seldom heard voices (people who we may not usually reach and effectively engage with). Groups approached and engaged with represented groups with protected characteristics.

11.1 Our Plan for Babergh provides a framework to promote environmental responsibility. The plan therefore will positively impact the environment through delivery of the strategic priorities identified.

# **Our Vision**

"To help to create a resilient, more sustainable future, with and for, all the residents and communities of Babergh"

We believe it is our role to help create a more sustainable future in Babergh. We are driven by doing what is right for our residents, communities, parishes and towns now and for the future.

Babergh District Council has a long tradition of political collaboration. Our commitment to partnership and cooperation, is exemplified by the make-up of our political administration<sup>1</sup> and the way we work together with our communities, our towns and parishes, the voluntary sector, and local businesses, to grasp the opportunities and respond to the challenges that confront us all.

In developing this plan, we have listened carefully to all your views, and we promise to continue to do so. We want to have continuous engagement and conversation with our communities.

We are extremely ambitious for all our communities and all our residents. We believe that a sustainable society must be built on the strong foundations of its communities, economy and environment. As described in this plan, we will further strengthen these foundations to develop more resilient communities, and even greater pride and aspiration in the towns and villages where you live.

We are committed to being open and honest with you. Councils across the land are struggling with the same challenges. Their financial position has been eroded each year since 2010 as they try to contend with the twin pressures of cuts in funding from central government and over the last two years by inflation which increases costs dramatically. Babergh District Council is not immune from these pressures. Whilst the Council's income from fees and charges for services and council tax has remained well below the rate of inflation, the cost of almost everything else from energy to materials has risen, together with interest rate rises. This means we will have to find extra income and / or savings of over £10m over the next four years just to continue delivering the services we currently do.

While this national economic crisis is not of our making, we must respond to it nevertheless – and must do so in a responsible way. In light of the serious financial challenges facing us we have difficult decisions to make.

We have already made significant savings year on year and have a absolute focus on running our services as efficiently as we can. But much more must be done, and some tough choices lie ahead. We remain committed to doing all we can to protect the essential services that local and vulnerable people rely on.

We will remain positive and ambitious; and we will continue to deliver good quality core district council services. However, we do need to reduce our costs as an organisation and increase some of the fees we charge for some services to balance our books. But we cannot keep doing this year after year. Yes, the backdrop is challenging but it demands that we use our expertise and ingenuity to develop new approaches to service design and delivery that meet your aspirations for the place where you live and creates a more sustainable future for all our residents and communities. Testing times call for imagination and innovation but also collaboration, listening to you about what you think is important and together we can develop sustainable local solutions to local issues.

# **POLLING DISTRICT REVIEW**

# 1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 This report seeks approval from full Council to adopt the Polling Districts and Polling Places. These are listed in Appendix A of the report. Following a review, the South Suffolk Parliamentary constituency now falls in its entirety within the boundaries of Babergh District Council. The appendix also contains details of the proposed polling stations; however, this is just for the Council to note as it is the responsibility of the Returning Officer at each election to allocate polling stations.

# 2. OPTIONS CONSIDERED

- 2.1 It is a statutory requirement with the Electoral Registration and Administration Act 2013 that every council in England and Wales must undertake and complete a review of all the polling districts and polling places in the area.
- 2.2 Furthermore, changes to the Polling Districts and Polling Places are required to take into account the changes to parliamentary constituency boundaries, made by The Parliamentary Constituencies Order 2023 following the review by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England.

# 3. RECOMMENDATION

3.1 That the Polling Districts and Polling Places as listed in Appendix A to this report be agreed.

# **REASON FOR DECISION**

3.3 To enable the Council to meet its obligations under the Electoral Registration and Administration Act 2013.

# 4. KEY INFORMATION

- 4.1 The Council's statutory review of polling districts and polling places commenced on the 6<sup>th</sup> October 2023 and ran until the 30<sup>th</sup> November 2023. The review has been conducted in accordance with the guidance published by the Electoral Commission.
- 4.2 Polling Districts, Places and Stations can be defined as follows:

**Polling District** – This is the administrative subdivision of a UK Parliamentary constituency into smaller geographical areas. Where an area is parished a polling district will usually be the whole parish. In larger parishes, or where there are parish warding arrangements there may be several polling districts designated within the parish boundary. It is for the Council to approve the designation of polling districts.

**Polling Place** – This is a definable place within the polling district where the polling station will be located. The polling place can be the whole polling district or a specified area within the polling district, however the Electoral Commission advises that it must be recognisable to electors throughout the polling district. It is for the Council to approve the designation of polling places.

**Polling Station** – This is the specific room or building within the polling place where polling will be conducted. It is for the Returning Officer at each election to determine the location of a polling station, however it must be located within the designated polling place for that polling district.

- 4.3 Interested parties including stakeholders, political groups, MP's and electors were invited to make any comments on the proposed changes to the Council's polling places, districts and polling stations. The full details of the consultation, including the consultation responses, and proposed changes can be viewed on the Council's web site.
- 4.4 Following the consultation process the Council has published at Appendix A, the details of the proposed designation of polling districts and polling places within the local authority area as a result of the review.
- 4.5 The result of the review provides a framework for operations within the Electoral Management System (EMS).

# 5. LINKS TO CORPORATE PLAN

5.1 This is a core electoral service and legislative requirement undertaken to fulfil Council obligations and in-keeping with good democratic governance.

# 6. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 6.1 In the event of a UK Parliamentary election all election costs are recoverable in full. For the Local Government elections in May 2027, election costs, where applicable, will be shared with the relevant town/parish councils.
- 6.2 The designation of an additional polling place is likely to cost between £1000 to £1500, these being costs incurred (inclusive of venue costs and staff fees, and not inclusive of electorate related fees) of providing a polling station at the polling place. Any additional polling place would therefore have a budgetary impact and would need to be reflected in the budget.

# 7. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

7.1 To comply with Section 17 of the Electoral Administration Act 2013, Babergh District Council is required to conduct a review of all parliamentary polling districts and polling places within the South Suffolk Parliamentary Constituency between 1<sup>st</sup> October 2023 and 30<sup>th</sup> January 2025.

# 8. RISK MANAGEMENT

8.1 The key risks are set out below:

Project plans are in place to ensure that the review is conducted in line with statutory requirements.

# 9. CONSULTATION

- 9.1 Consultation has taken place with stakeholders, town and parish councils, district councillors, County Councillors, Members of Parliament, and party-political groups.
- 9.2 The Electoral Registration Officer has a statutory responsibility to consult with the Acting Returning Officer for any constituency which falls within the local authority area. The Electoral Registration Officer is the Acting Returning Officer for the South Suffolk Constituency.
- 9.3 The Electoral Registration Officer has a statutory obligation to consult any individual or group that may have particular expertise in accessibility considerations for polling places. The Disability Forum has been consulted in that regard.

# 10. EQUALITY ANALYSIS

10.1 The Council must seek to ensure that all the electors in the district/constituency have such reasonable facilities for voting as are practicable in the circumstances and to ensure that so far as is reasonable and practicable, the polling places they are responsible for are accessible to all electors, including those with a disability, and when considering the designation of a polling place, must have regard to the accessibility needs of disabled persons. An equality impact assessment is attached at appendix B.

#### 11. ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

11.1 There are no environmental implications arising directly from this report. However, when selecting polling stations, the Returning Officer considers the accessibility of the venue by public transport and on foot to avoid additional unnecessary travel by car.

#### What exactly is proposed?

Review of Polling Places and Polling Districts

#### Why?

Every four years local authorities are required to review its UK parliamentary polling districts and polling places. The proposed changes to the polling districts and polling places have also taken into account the changes to Babergh and Mid Suffolk's District Council's ward boundaries made by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England.

#### What will the effect of the changes be?

### What is the profile or make up of your service users by protected characteristics?

Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Councils face a number of challenges relating to electoral engagement. The largest of these is the far lower propensity of some (largely urban) wards to turn out to vote during elections. These wards tend to contain higher proportions of people disadvantaged by class, unemployment, high levels of rental accommodation, lack of qualifications and general relative socio-economic deprivation. They also tend to contain a large proportion of young people and homemovers, ethnic minorities, residents with countries of birth outside of the U.K., those with low levels of English language proficiency and disabled people. This is probably related to the very low representation of all of these groups, as well as of women, as elected public officials (whether Councillors or MPs) in the Babergh and Mid Suffolk area.

All wards have a significant number of their population between the ages of 16-19, who will soon be eligible to vote and who must be targeted in order to ensure that they are registered to vote in any elections that occur when they are of voting age. The Council should continue to gather data on wards with low levels of voting rates, in order to determine whether the designated polling stations are causing any challenges to these groups of people or whether the underlying social factors (such as remoteness, poor Wi-Fi coverage combined with high levels of younger people) that are driving this.




1. Akenham



- 1.1. Proposed change: From Claydon and Barham Village Hall to Henley Community Centre
- 1.2. Akenham have consulted with the District to ensure that electors are suitably able to vote.
- 1.3. Their previous voting place at Claydon and Barham Village Hall featured extended vehicular travel with no direct route.
- 1.4. The new location at Henley Community Centre is more convenient and endorsed by the Ward Councillor.
- 1.5. This location is already being utilised by the District so bears no additional burdens.



#### 2. Aldham




- 2.1. Proposed *Trial* change: From Elmsett & Aldham Village Hall to The Parish Room at St Mary's Church Aldham.
- 2.2. Aldham have consulted with the District to ensure that electors are suitably able to vote.
- 2.3. Their previous voting place at Elmsett & Aldham Village Hall was considered to be some distance from the electorate.
- 2.4. The new location at The Parish Room was previously used as a polling place for Aldham, however the amenities for Polling Staff and Electors was questioned. The Parish will assist the District in reoperating the Polling place for the upcoming Police & Crime Commissioner Election in May, and a review will be held thereafter to reconsider the Polling place in practise for future elections
- 2.5. The Ward Councillor was consulted and weighed towards the views of the parishioners.
- 2.6. This location would be an additional location and bears some additional new burdens and provisions the District must be aware of.





#### 3. Flowton



- 3.1. Proposed *Trial* change: From Somersham Village Hall to St Mary's Church Flowton.
- 3.2. Flowton have consulted with the District to ensure that electors are suitably able to vote.
- 3.3. Their previous voting place at Somersham Village Hall was considered to be some distance from the electorate, down a narrow, winding, and hazardous (under adverse weather conditions) road.
- 3.4. The new location at St Mary's Church was previously used as a polling place for Flowton, however the amenities for Polling Staff and Electors was previously in question. The Church has recently undergone renovations providing disabled-friendly facilities, including toilet and kitchen area. The Parish will assist the District in reoperating the Polling place for the upcoming Police & Crime Commissioner Election in May, and a review will be held thereafter to reconsider the Polling place in practise for future elections.
- 3.5. The Ward Councillor was consulted and favours changes to enfranchise parishioners.
- 3.6. This location would be an additional location and bears some additional new burdens and provisions the District must be aware of.













#### 4. Kenton



- 4.1. Proposed change: From Dove Cottage Debenham to Bedingfield Village Hall.
- 4.2. Kenton have consulted with the District to ensure that electors are able to vote at their desired location.
- 4.3. Their previous voting place at Dove Cottage was considered to have been allocated without consultation and that the original change from their historic caravan use was to Bedingfield Village Hall. This change is thus a restorative change to re-empower the parishioners.
- 4.4. This location is already being utilised by the District so bears no additional burdens.



#### 5. Sudbury



- 5.1. Proposed changes: **St Leonards** from Elizabeth Court to Sudbury Town Hall.
  - 5.1.1. As the District is closing use of Elizabeth Court as a polling place, the Town Hall is the closest alternative.
  - 5.1.2. Sudbury Town Hall is already utilised as a Polling place, so it reflects no additional burdens.
- 5.2. Proposed changes: **Sudbury East** and **Hawkins Road** from the Ormiston Sudbury Academy to Leading Lives Community Hub.
  - 5.2.1. The electorate and representatives have requested a change of venue, the Leading Lives Community Hub has been newly established to meet this need.
  - 5.2.2. This location would be an additional location and bears some additional new burdens and provisions the District must be aware of.
- 5.3. Proposed changes: **Sudbury South** and **Elm & Hillside** from Elizabeth Court and Sudbury Town Hall (respectively) to Nwes South Suffolk Business Centre.
  - 5.3.1. Both Polling Districts have been consulted to have had extended distances to their previous Polling places.
  - 5.3.2. Nwes South Suffolk Business Centre is a newly established Polling place. This represents a transfer from the closing a previous Polling place, however, the cost burdens will be higher as the place is a private venue as opposed to the previous Council owned venue.
  - 5.3.3. The new Polling place is centrally located for both Polling districts and is considered a better fit.
- 5.4. Sudbury Town Council and the Ward Councillors for Sudbury North East and Sudbury South East were consulted and have endorsed the changes.
