- The Museum of East Anglian Life intends to take on Crack Wood and the Allotments which in turn present several short- and long-term opportunities for community amenity and biodiversity. The project would both address existing issues and deliver clear community and economic benefits.
- Both Crack Wood and the allotments have been minimally managed over the past two decades. Currently there are issues with security
 and the current boundary is also unattractive. The proposal would provide a better space for food growing as well as creating a new
 community amenity for Combs Ford involving local people.
- The existing river trail is currently inaccessible throughout much of the year. Access to green space, which is accessible locally is important. It is a multi-stage project which would ultimately result in the creation of a new wetland, new enhanced community allotments and new paths, including a year-round disabled accessible route along the River Rattlesden. Access to the river trail and woodland be via the Museum's main entrance, which is currently £12 a year. Access to the allotments would be via an allotment rental agreement.
- The amount of CIL funding is regarded as acceptable under the terms of the CIL Expenditure Framework as the CIL Bid of £75,000.00 represents 65% of the total project costs. It lies within the community infrastructure thresholds of not exceeding £75,000 and 75% of the

total costs. This project has been delivered under the Community Infrastructure section within the Infrastructure Funding Statement (Infrastructure List) for Mid Suffolk.

RECOMMENDATION

• Recommendation to Cabinet to approve CIL Bid for £75,000.00 which is 65% of the total project costs from the Ringfenced Fund and Local Infrastructure Fund (subject to confirmation of a signed lease)
